Advent challenges our thinking about the entire created universe, its purpose and its end. Do we have a credible response to the secular idea that there is no inherent right or wrong, no value embedded in life's existence, but that everything is only what we as humans decide it shall be?

The great divide between the secular and Christian view of the world is to be found at this point of meaning. For life and the universe to have any meaning it can only be that behind all reality lies God. Take God out of the picture and life is without any point or significance at all. As Christians, however, we need to reflect deeply on the question of how God and the universe are related.
