Then Jesus said to the Twelve, 'What about you, do you want to go away too?' Simon Peter answered, 'Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the message of eternal life, and we believe; we have come to know that you are the Holy One of God.'

Wednesday 2nd week in Lent

John reinforces his recognition of the eucharistic elements as the tipping point between faith and unfaith. The scene in which the disciples find Jesus' language intolerable and unacceptable reflected the reaction of many in John's community – as it does still in our contemporary world. The words of Jesus that follow recognise that there is no way of reaching such people with rational argument or any kind of witness. They have to be left to go their own way.

Jesus then turns to the remainder of the disciples and asks them why they also do not leave. In responding to the question, Peter's confession of faith does not contain the kind of intuitive leap that the synoptic gospels record. Rather, speaking on behalf of the remaining group, he says in effect, "We don't understand but we trust you and we'll stick by you." With that, many of us can identify. We, too, do not understand. The mystery of who Jesus was and is remains beyond our comprehension. Yet we 'know', we trust, we worship – and we continue to follow.
